
A Review of Prominent Black Theologians - Week Two

The Rev. Dr. James H. Cone

The Rev. Dr. James H. Cone, often hailed as the father of Black Liberation Theology, has left an indelible mark on both the academic world and the faith community. His profound influence extends deeply into the United Methodist Church.

Born in 1938 in Fordyce, Arkansas, Dr. Cone grew up in devout family who were members of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. His early exposure to the church's teachings on justice and equality shaped his understanding of faith as a powerful tool for social change.

Dr. Cone's groundbreaking work, "Black Theology & Black Power," published in 1969, established a new framework for understanding the



intersection of faith and racial justice. In this work, he asserted that Christianity must address the systemic injustices faced by Black Americans. His theology emphasized that God's presence is found with the marginalized and that the church must actively participate in the struggle for liberation.

Cone's work continues to be influential and has been both used and critiqued inside and outside the African-American theological community. He was the Charles Augustus Briggs Distinguished Professor of Systematic Theology at Columbia University-affiliated Union Theological Seminary until his death.

The legacy of the Rev. Dr. James Cone continues to inspire the United Methodist Church and the broader Christian community. His unwavering dedication to justice, equality, and faith serves as a guiding light for those committed to living out the gospel's call to love and liberate.

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION⁴

Sometimes we are afraid to tell others about our experiences of the holy and about God's call in our lives, because we don't want to annoy or oppress others. There is a difference between witnessing through indoctrination and witnessing through acts of compassion. How do you witness to others about your faith? The disciples had already fished all night without catching anything; what quality or characteristic in Peter might have helped him "give it another try" when Jesus invited him to cast his net again? What quality or characteristic within you helps you to keep trying, to start again, after disappointment or even failure?
